Tax Credits

A variety of tax credits are available for energy efficiency from the federal government for tax years 2009 and 2010. Details can be found at <u>www.energystar.gov/taxcredits</u>. These include:

- For existing homes, tax credits are at 30% of the cost up to \$1,500:
 - Windows and Doors
 - o Insulation
 - Roofs (Metal and Asphalt)
 - HVAC
 - Water Heaters (non-solar)
 - Biomass Stoves
- For existing homes and new construction tax credits are available at 30% of the cost, with no upper limit through 2016 for:
 - Geothermal Heat Pumps
 - o Solar Panels
 - Solar Water Heaters
 - Small Wind Energy Systems < Cells>

Ways to Green Your Home



• Turn down your thermostat. Lowering the thermostat by just one degree can reduce heating energy costs by about 4%

• Use ceiling fans in the summer AND winter. By reversing the direction of the blades, warm air is pushed down, helping to keep rooms warm in the winter

• Conserve energy by using Energy Star products. Look for the rating. For example, comparing a 1990 model refrigerator with an Energy Star-qualified refrigerator saves enough electricity to light a home for more that 4.5 months!

• Repair leaky fixtures. Only one drop per second from a leaky faucet can waste as much as 10 gallons of water each week.

 Install low-flow showerheads, faucets, and toilets. Low-flow faucets can save up to 2.1 trillion gallons of water and an estimated \$11.3 million nationwide every day
