**Call to Order**

**Minutes**

The minutes of the December 1, 2011 Police Committee meeting were approved 3-0

**Workload Analysis Review**

Chief Brown reviewed a draft workload analysis that was included in the committee packet. Chief Brown advised that the purpose of the workload analysis is used to determine how much work the officers are engaged in, what categories of work they are engaged in and what percentage of their effort is self generated as compared to what is the result of a call for service via 911. Chief Brown advised that the initial review of data was for a one month period and additional data would be analyzed as part of the final workload analysis. Chief Brown answered committee questions and anticipates further review with the committee in 60 days.

**Department Report**

The staff provided a verbal overview of the departmental monthly activity. Administrator Vana advised that DUCOMM allows staff to prepare a more useful report than we were able to provide in the past. Chief reviewed an outline of the information to be included in future reports. In addition, Administrator Vana advised that Alderman Poteraske had sent an email regarding the City's taser policy. Staff gave a brief overview of the policy and this issue will be added to February's Police Committee for discussion.

Chairman McIvor announced that the next Committee meeting will be on Thursday, February 2, 2012, 6:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers. She also noted that she is conducting a town hall meeting on February 2<sup>nd</sup>, at 7:30 pm so the February committee meeting needs to be concluded by 7:30.

## FY 2012/2013 EQUIPMENT REPLACEMENT INFORMATION

### Description of item to be replaced.

This budget request is a request to replace a canine. During the period up to late 2011, the Darien Police Department fielded a canine team consisting of two canine officers and their canine partners. In late 2011, canine Rolfe passed away due to illness leaving the Darien Police Department with only one canine and handler. The remaining canine is also older and may only have 12-18 months of service left. It should be clear that this does not suggest that the remaining canine is near death, but that the canine may no longer be able to cope with the rigors of being a working canine beyond the 12-18 month projection. With that in mind and with a preferable future in mind I am making the request for an additional canine to replace Canine Rolfe. I am anticipating being able to use the canine program in Darien more proactively rather than simply waiting to be called into service, there is a library of potential uses that a working canine could have that would bode well for the Department's networking capacity and contraband recovery capability.

### Status/Condition of item to be replaced.

The previously active canine is deceased

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### Year item was/is scheduled for replacement

This line item request did not have a scheduled or anticipated replacement cycle. The death of canine Rolfe was unanticipated. As a general rule of thumb, and barring any unforeseen tragedy such as injury to an officer canine, we can anticipate 8-10 years of service from a working canine. However, there are no hard and fast rules, because it is conceivable that a dog could develop a condition or disease and the anticipated work life would be shortened.

### Additional information, including mileage/hours, condition, repair history, accident history. Include additional supporting material if needed.

Clearly, if we evaluate the necessity for a replacement canine based solely on the volume of crime as it exists today, it becomes exceedingly difficult to quantify the need for such an acquisition. However, if we look beyond the borders of Darien at some of the surrounding communities, we can see that the need for a canine may be greater than we think. Viewing this acquisition in anticipation of what the

probable future holds makes it clear, that when neighboring communities are experiencing drug related homicides, the use of the interstates as drug trafficking corridors and I-55, 294, 355, and 80 have in the past all shown a nexus to the movement of narcotics in bulk, it is evident that there is a certain amount of utility to having a canine available. The key here is pro-active use of the canine (as with all of our resources) rather than just waiting to be summoned into service.

**Description of replacement item, including upgrades and technological improvements.**

Essentially the request for the replacement canine involves the physical acquisition of the animal and the training related to preparing the dog for law enforcement work and familiarization of commands with the handler.

### Description of item to be replaced.

Replace ten (10) Tasers. The Taser devices were purchased and are no longer covered by the extended warranty.

### Status/Condition of item to be replaced.

They are of the earlier generation of these devices and repair costs now outweigh the replacement costs, in that, the older they get the more likely they are to experience a malfunction or breakdown requiring repair.

### Year item was/is scheduled for replacement

The replacement of these devices is based upon several factors. The level of use will result in a certain level of diminished viability. When coupled with the constant enhancements to the technology of the devices an operational obsolescence is created. This obsolescence is based upon the fact that the technology that was used on the older models is obsolete and has been replaced by updated technology that decreases the utility and functionality of the older devices.

### Additional information, including mileage/hours, condition, repair history, accident history. Include additional supporting material if needed.

The Department currently has nine (9) Taser devices in inventory. In the event the shift is fully staffed, then the School Resource Officer is unable to take a TASER. In that deployment to the field is a viable alternative to other forms of force, it is essential that there be sufficient Tasers available to allow all on duty personnel to be armed with a Taser when they are working in the field.

### Description of replacement item, including upgrades and technological improvements.

The replacement devices would be the latest in Taser technology the Taser X2 model. Based upon industry assessment, it is believed that the device is more durable than were earlier versions of the device and as such more suited to the rigors of field duty when worn on an officer's vest cover or Taser holster.

**Disposition of old equipment. The old Tasers would be retained in inventory until they were no longer serviceable and then discarded using acceptable industry-wide practices for such destruction**

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## **TASER™ Guidelines**

### **309.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE**

When properly applied in accordance with this policy, the TASER™ device is considered a non-deadly control device that is intended to control a violent or potentially violent individual, while minimizing the risk of serious injury. It is anticipated that the appropriate use of such a device will result in fewer serious injuries to officers and suspects.

### **309.2 POLICY**

Patrol personnel who have completed department approved training will carry a department TASER™ for use during their patrol shift, if available. The device unit number will be recorded at the beginning of the shift by the shift sergeant / OIC. Personnel will return their issued device to the department's storage closet at the end of their shift.

Officers shall only use a TASER™ and cartridges that have been issued by the Department. The device may be carried as a part of a uniformed officer's equipment in an approved holster on the duty belt, a shoulder holster, a cargo pant holster or on the outside vest carrier.

- (a) When the TASER™ is carried as a part of a uniformed officer's equipment, the TASER™ should be carried on the side opposite from the duty weapon or in a cross-draw format.
- (b) All TASER™ shall be clearly and distinctly marked to differentiate them from the duty weapon and any other device.
- (c) Whenever practical, officers should carry a total of two TASER™ cartridges on their person at all times while carrying a TASER™.
- (d) Officers shall be responsible for ensuring that their issued TASER™ is properly maintained and in good working order at all times.
- (e) Officers should never hold a firearm and the TASER™ at the same time unless lethal force is justified.
- (f) A TASER may be brought into the booking room with approval of the shift sergeant/OIC for unruly arrestees.

### **309.3 VERBAL AND VISUAL WARNINGS**

A verbal warning of the intended use of the TASER™ should precede its application, unless it would otherwise endanger the safety of officers or when it is not practicable due to the circumstances. The purpose of the warning is for the following:

- (a) Provide the individual with a reasonable opportunity to voluntarily comply.
- (b) Warn other officers and individuals that a TASER™ may be deployed.

If, after a verbal warning, an individual is unwilling to voluntarily comply with an officer's lawful orders and it appears both reasonable and practical under the circumstances, the officer may, but is not required to, display the electrical arc (provided there is not a cartridge loaded into the TASER™) or the laser in a further attempt to gain compliance prior to the application of the TASER™. The aiming laser should never be intentionally directed into the eyes of another as it may permanently impair his/her vision.

### *TASER™ Guidelines*

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The fact that a verbal and/or other warning was given, or the reasons it was not given, shall be documented by the officer deploying an TASER™ in any related reports.

#### **309.4 USE OF THE TASER™**

As with any law enforcement equipment, the TASER™ has limitations and restrictions requiring consideration before its use. The TASER™ should only be used when its operator can safely approach the subject within the operational range of the TASER™. Although the TASER™ is generally effective in controlling most individuals, officers should be alert to the potential for failure and be prepared with other options.

##### **309.4.1 FACTORS TO DETERMINE REASONABLENESS OF FORCE**

The application of the TASER™ is likely to cause intense, but momentary, pain. As such, officers should carefully consider and balance the totality of circumstances available prior to using the TASER™ including, but not limited to, the following factors:

- (a) The conduct of the individual being confronted (as reasonably perceived by the officer at the time).
- (b) Officer/subject factors (i.e., age, size, relative strength, skill level, injury/exhaustion, number of officers vs. subjects).
- (c) Influence of drugs/alcohol (mental capacity).
- (d) Proximity of weapons.
- (e) The degree to which the subject has been effectively restrained and his/her ability to resist despite being restrained.
- (f) Time and circumstances permitting, the availability of other options (what resources are reasonably available to the officer under the circumstances).
- (g) Seriousness of the suspected offense or the reason for contact with the individual.
- (h) Training and experience of the officer.
- (i) Potential for injury to citizens, officers and suspects.
- (j) Risk of escape.
- (k) Other exigent circumstances.

##### **309.4.2 APPLICATION OF THE TASER™**

Authorized personnel may use the TASER™ when circumstances known to the individual officer at the time indicate that such application is reasonable to control a person in any of the following circumstances:

- (a) A violent or physically resisting subject.
- (b) A subject who, by words or action, has demonstrated an intention to be violent or to physically resist and who reasonably appears to present the potential to harm officers, him/herself or others.
  1. When practicable, the officer should give the subject a verbal warning of the intended use of the TASER™ followed by a reasonable opportunity to voluntarily comply.
  2. Other available options reasonably appear ineffective or would present a greater danger to the officer, the subject or others.

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#### **309.4.3 SPECIAL DEPLOYMENT CONSIDERATIONS**

The use of the TASER™ should generally be avoided in the following situations unless the totality of the circumstances indicate that other available options reasonably appear ineffective, impractical, or would present a greater danger to the officer, the subject or others, and the officer reasonably believes that the need to control the individual outweighs the risk of using the TASER™:

- (a) Pregnant females.
- (b) Elderly individuals or obvious juveniles.
- (c) Individuals who are handcuffed or otherwise restrained.
- (d) Individuals who have been recently sprayed with a flammable chemical agent or who are otherwise in close proximity to any flammable material.
- (e) Individuals whose position or activity may result in collateral injury (e.g., falls from height, operating vehicles).

Because the application of the TASER™ in the drive-stun mode (i.e. direct contact without darts) relies primarily on pain compliance and requires close proximity to the subject, additional caution should be exercised. The application in drive-stun mode should be limited to brief application in which pain compliance would reasonably appear necessary to achieve control.

The TASER™ shall not be used to torture, psychologically torment, elicit statements or to punish any individual.

#### **309.4.4 TARGETING CONSIDERATIONS**

While manufacturers generally recommend that reasonable efforts should be made to target lower center mass and to avoid intentionally targeting the head, neck, chest and groin, it is recognized that the dynamics of each situation and officer safety may not permit the officer to limit the application of the TASER™ darts to a precise target area. As such, officers should take prompt and ongoing care to monitor the condition of the subject if one or more darts strikes the head, neck, chest or groin until he/she is released to the care of paramedics or other medical personnel.

#### **309.4.5 MULTIPLE APPLICATIONS OF THE TASER™**

If the first application of the TASER™ appears to be ineffective in gaining control of an individual and if circumstances allow, the officer should consider the following before additional applications of the TASER™:

- (a) Whether the probes or darts are making proper contact.
- (b) Whether the application of the TASER™ is interfering with the ability of the individual to comply.
- (c) Whether verbal commands, other options or tactics may be more effective.

This, however, shall not preclude any officer from deploying multiple, reasonable applications of the TASER™ on an individual.

#### **309.4.6 REPORT OF USE**

All TASER™ discharges shall be documented in the related case report and on the TASER™ portion of the After Action Report form and notification made to a supervisor in compliance with policy § 300.4.1. Accidental discharges of a TASER™ cartridge will also be documented on the TASER™ report form. Any report documenting the discharge of

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a TASER™ cartridge will include the cartridge serial number and an explanation of the circumstances surrounding the discharge.

The onboard TASER™ memory will be downloaded through the data port by the Taser officer and saved with the related reports. Photographs of probe sites should be taken, Anti-Felon Identification (AFID) tags should be collected and the expended cartridge along with both probes and wire should be submitted by the officer collecting the cartridge into evidence for future reference. The cartridge serial number should be noted and documented on the evidence paperwork. The evidence packaging should be marked "Biohazard" if the probes penetrated the subject's skin.

#### **309.5 MEDICAL TREATMENT**

Officers may remove TASER darts from suspects prior to arrival of paramedics. Darts should be placed - barb first into the used cartridge - seal the holes with tape or a rubber glove. Used TASER™ darts shall be considered a sharp biohazard, similar to a used hypodermic needle. Universal precautions should be taken accordingly.

All persons who have been struck by TASER™ darts or who have been subjected to the electric discharge of the device shall be medically assessed prior to booking. Additionally, any such individual who falls under any of the following categories should, as soon as practicable, be examined by paramedics or other qualified medical personnel:

- (a) The person is suspected of being under the influence of controlled substances and/or alcohol.
- (b) The person may be pregnant.
- (c) The person reasonably appears to be in need of medical attention.
- (d) The TASER™ darts are lodged in a sensitive area (e.g., groin, female breast, near the eyes).
- (e) The person requests medical treatment.

Persons who exhibit extreme agitation, violent irrational behavior accompanied by profuse sweating, extraordinary strength beyond their physical characteristics, imperviousness to pain (sometimes called "excited delirium") or who require a protracted physical encounter with multiple officers to be brought under control, may be at an increased risk of sudden death and should be examined by qualified medical personnel as soon as practicable. Any individual exhibiting signs of distress after such an encounter shall be medically cleared prior to booking.

If any individual refuses medical attention, such a refusal should be witnessed by another officer and/or medical personnel and shall be fully documented in related reports. If an audio recording is made of the contact or an interview with the individual, any refusal should be included if possible.

The transporting officer shall inform any person receiving custody or any person placed in a position of providing care that the individual has been subjected to the application of the TASER™.

#### **309.6 TRAINING**

In addition to the initial department-approved training required to carry and use a TASER™, any personnel who have not carried a TASER™ as a part of their assignment for a period of twelve months or more shall be re-qualified by a department-approved TASER™ instructor prior to again carrying or using the device. A reassessment of an officer's knowledge and/or

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practical skill may be required at any time if deemed appropriate by the Deputy Chief of Operations.

The Deputy Chief of Operations should ensure that all training includes the following:

- (a) A review of this policy.
- (b) A review of the Use of Force Policy § 300.
- (c) Target area considerations, to include techniques or options to reduce the intentional application of probes near the head, neck, chest, and groin.
- (d) De-escalation techniques.

## MOTNHLY CRIME REPORT

JANUARY 2012

- There were 2,900 events created by DU-COMM.
- 184 of those events resulted in a case report being completed by an Officer.
- Resulting in 88 arrests
- The arrest offenses included:
  - a. 8 narcotics related offenses
  - b. 3 retail theft arrests
  - c. 2 criminal damage to property arrests
  - d. 55 traffic related arrests including 10 for driving under the influence
  - e. 2 theft of gas arrests
  - f. The remaining arrests were for various misdemeanor or ordinance violations.
- In early January 2012 there was a search warrant executed by members of the Darien Police Department. Charges remain pending for a variety of offenses:
  - a. Narcotics recovered
  - b. Pirating equipment and paraphernalia was recovered
  - c. Numerous rounds of ammunition
  - d. Several firearms including an AK-47
  - e. United States Currency
  - f. All items are currently either at the lab for confirmatory analysis and those items eligible for seizure have been documented as such.
- We are continuing to work with DU-COMM and others on the workload analysis to ensure it is as concise and accurate as possible.

- We are exploring regionalized purchasing and training opportunities
- Community engagement efforts are continuing. I spoke at a mentoring group from the Lace school, and attended the Darien Historical Society annual luncheon in January, Also hosted a meeting of school administrators from the area.
- There were no other issues of relative importance that occurred during the month of January.
