Agenda Memo - Mutual Aid Agreement-Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System

Staff advised the City of Darien currently participates in ILEAS, an intergovernmental cooperative that facilitates mutual aid for police departments. Recently, ILEAS reviewed their mutual aid agreement and have made updates and specifically acknowledges that ILEAS was created to oversee logistics of statewide mutual aid. It also gives specifics on how the governing board operates. ILEAS allows Darien to request or deploy law enforcement resources regionally and across the state, at no cost. As an example, when a tornado struck Washington, Illinois in 2013 the Chief of Police made one call to ILEAS, which coordinated the response statewide. The City of Darien may be the beneficiaries of this service in the future, or could help nearby communities that face a similar catastrophe. The Committee unanimously approved recommending a resolution authorizing the City Administrator to sign, the Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Agreement.



An updated survey was sent to several police departments regarding gaming machines in their jurisdictions. The departments that replied had no changes to the survey taken last year, except for a couple of comments.

VIDEO GAMING SURVEY

DEPARTMENT Harvard	The moreuse in criminal decret, or early for service.	RESPONSE AUGUST 2014 No change. There has been quite a bit of interest in video gambling in town and quite a lot of money lost in the City to gambling. There is some concern, although nothing has been formally expressed, as to the long term impact of so much money being lost.

Carpentersville	No additional call load related to gaming.	
East Dundee	Just begun to have machines installed. They do not foresee any difference in future call load.	It is generally a non-event. Some video gaming licensees have not realized the profits envisioned and I would foresee a drop-off in such operations that present themselves as "bistros", etc. We've already had one licensee that has "given up" its machines. We charge a licensing fee of \$1,000/annually and \$250/machine/annually and tie it to our liquor licensing.

DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS

July 2014

DARIEN POLICE AT WORK

As you are aware, two years ago we implemented a park district initiative at Darien Community Park. The goal of that initiative was to encourage the use of Darien Community Park by ensuring that it was safe for families to go to and engage in positive activities that would tend to displace negative activity. The effort has clearly paid off. This year for the summer, our partnership with the park has grown through the weekly Farmer's Market, held at Darien Community Park. As you may also know, there has been some concern about the parking issues along 71st street during the Wednesday event. For the sake of clarification, the Darien Police Department's goal is one of support:

- Supporting positive park district usage
- > Supporting the residents who live adjacent to the park
- > Supporting the attendees to the park events
- > Supporting the goals of City governance

It is my hope that in this support we are able to find a mid-point that is agreeable to all. In meeting those goals, the following factors are taken into consideration:

- > Evaluating existing parking restrictions to ensure that they are practical
- Assessing the goals of City governance to ensure safe and positive use of the parks
- > Ensuring the events held at the park are successful by accommodating the needs of the attendees
- > Being mindful of any unreasonable burden placed upon the full-time residents adjacent to the park

Please enjoy the park and feel free to make suggestions regarding what the Darien Police Department can do to enhance your experiences at the park or anywhere else in Darien.

Darien Police officers responded to a major illegal fireworks display on Clemons during the 7th police period. These fireworks were illegal and many were of professional grade and highly dangerous. One subject was arrested and private cameras used to record the illegal activity were also inventoried. As a reminder, the use of all fireworks in Illinois is illegal. Beyond the legal ramifications, they are dangerous and should only be used by a pyro techniques expert under very controlled conditions.

On Friday August 1, 2014, the Darien Police Department administered its sergeant's promotional examination. The examination occurs in two distinct phases. Phase I was the written part administered on August 1st. The next phase of the examination process will be an assessment component that will test performance in a wide range of scenarios. The promotional test will immediately impact the vacancy left by the retirement of Sergeant David Stock, who left the department in January 2014. The promotional list will remain active for three years. Good Luck to the Darien officers engaged in this process.

We owe a special debt of thanks to the folks at Carmelite Village. Officer Austin Jump of the Darien Police Department learned that the facility would soon be demolished and took the initiative to inquire to see if it could be used as training facility for the Darien Police Department pending the demolition. He was given the go ahead and Officer Jump was able to facilitate some very essential training that dealt with active shooter preparation and breaching (making entry into buildings). Since there is no way to practice

and hone these skills without actually doing it, this training and the use of the Carmelite buildings was an invaluable resource.

We recently forged a new relationship with our counterparts in the Department of Homeland Security (ICE). As part of that informal agreement, we will make our canine available for searches related to money and drug seizures. This becomes another avenue to ensure that our canine and canine handler continue to develop their skills in a non-training environment and creates another avenue to acquire seized funds through the Equitable Sharing Program through the Department of Justice and United States Marshalls Service.

DETECTIVE STATS

Detectives began the 7th period with 52 cases; four cases were closed, two cases were closed by arrest and prosecution and two cases were exceptional closed.

There were seven (7) new cases added, and thirteen (13) cases were suspended. We began the 8th police period with 45 active cases being investigated. Including cases that have been suspended pending lab results, we have the following:

30 cases from 2014

25 cases from 2013

2 cases from 2012

1 case from 2011

Cases include:

12 theft incidents including identity

- 8 burglaries
- 5 burglary to motor vehicle
- 3 hit and run traffic offenses
- 2 robberies
- 2 death investigations

CRIME PREVENTION

The Darien Police Department continues to work with other agencies to identify potential threats to Darien from individuals being released from the Illinois Department of Corrections and paroled to this jurisdiction. We recently learned of a particular penitentiary release to Darien who has a violent background. The Detective Unit and Crime Analyst will be coordinating with the Illinois Parole Board to identify the subject's parole agent and we will be seeking ways to monitor this subject as long as he remains on parole.

CRIME FREE HOUSING ORDINANCE

We recently completed training of two officers in furthering the implementation of our Crime Free Housing Ordinance. We anticipate that we will shortly commence training the property managers in the Crime Free Housing Ordinance protocol. The training will consist of; ordinance provisions, registering properties, writing smarter leases, collaborating with the Darien Police Department among several other topics. The Crime Free Housing Ordinance, training and implementation are being developed to take additional steps at keeping Darien one of the safest cities in the Midwest. The goal is to ensure viable stake-holdership and to create a sense of community as newer citizens move into Darien as renters and ensure that they, early on, become fully engaged in a culture that supports good citizenship and safety.

CRIME TIPS

There were nine (9) burglaries to motor vehicle incidents that occurred during the 7th police period. Four of those were cleared by arrest, with the arrest of a juvenile subject. We were able to recover some proceeds taken in those burglaries as a result of the arrest. Kudos to the Darien officers making the arrest! As great as it is to get an arrest, it means that TEAM DARIEN (police and citizens) has once again failed at our jobs. I say that because all nine of the vehicles entered were entered by way of a vehicle that was left unlocked. The burglary to motor vehicle incidents all occurred overnight and it is, therefore, unlikely the burglary suspect would risk breaking a window if the doors had been locked. Please remember to lock your doors. The officers of the Darien Police Department will continue aggressive preventive patrolling and work to zero in on known offenders, but it is far better to prevent the burglary than to respond to it.

CHILDREN IN THE ROADWAY

Many schools will open prior to the next update from the Darien Police Department. As the schools open, more and more of our young people will be moving about. For the high schools there will sporting events, for the junior High and middle schools there will be other events. As motorists, we all need to add an extra dose of vigilance to our driving so that our young people are safe. PLEASE WATCH OUT FOR CHILDREN.
