- In person attendance at City Council meetings have resumed as of June 1, 2020. All elected officials may elect to participate in a City Council meeting by way of audio or video conferencing. The Council member's absence must be because of personal illness or disability; employment purposes; city business; or a family or other emergency. If a member of the council wishes to attend the meeting by means of a video or audio conference, the member must notify the city clerk of his or her nonattendance as soon as is reasonably possible so that the clerk may make appropriate arrangements.
- The public will be permitted to attend a City Council meeting but the meeting room will be limited to 50 members of the public at one time. The public will be required to maintain social distancing rules and are required to wear a mask while in the building.
- Members of the public physically present must be able to hear all discussion and testimony and all votes of the members of the body. This would mean that members of the public physically present, if more than 50, can be in a different room at City Hall. For example, this can be accomplished by offering a call-in telephone number, a web-based link such as YouTube presenting meeting live or viewing the meeting on cable at City Hall.





In determining use or intent under this Section, the trier of fact can take into consideration the general, usual, customary and historical use to which the item involved has been put, and/or the proximity of the cannabis or controlled substance to the drug paraphernalia or the presence of cannabis or controlled substance on the drug paraphernalia. 

#### **ON-PREMISES CONSUMPTION**

A unit of local government, including a home rule unit, or any non-home rule county within the unincorporated territory of the county may regulate the on-premises consumption of cannabis at or in a cannabis business establishment within its jurisdiction in a manner consistent with the CRTA. The CRTA applies the restrictions of the Smoke Free Illinois Act on smoking cannabis and provides that property owners may prohibit the use of cannabis by any guest, lessee, customer or visitor.

#### DISPENSARIES

The CRTA pertains to the possession, use, cultivation, transportation, and dispensing of adult-use cannabis. The City of Darien has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that protect the public health, safety, and welfare of its citizens.

The City of Darien will permit adult use recreational cannabis dispensaries consistent with zoning ordinances regulating adult use recreational cannabis business establishments, including rules adopted governing the time, place, manner, and number of cannabis business establishments, and minimum distance limitations between cannabis business establishments and locations the City deems sensitive through a special use process.

The appropriate zoning ordinances, rules, and definitions shall be promulgated in the City's Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) effective January 1, 2020, as amended from time-to-time.

#### 8-7-2 VIOLATION

- A. It is unlawful for any person to manufacture, deliver, or possess any and all equipment, products, and materials of any kind which are peculiar to and marketed for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing in the human body any controlled substance, including any and all articles listed in the Illinois Drug Paraphernalia Control Act, 720 Illinois Compiled Statutes 600, as amended.
- B. It is unlawful for any person under the age of twenty-one (21), or not in compliance with the Illinois Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, to knowingly possess any quantity of any substance containing cannabis, except that the effect of this chapter shall be limited for purposes of municipal prosecution to persons knowingly possessing less than thirty grams (30g) of cannabis flower; five hundred milligrams (500mg) of tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) contained in cannabis-infused product; or five grams (5g) of cannabis concentrates. Unless authorized under the Illinois Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Pilot Program Act or the Illinois Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, it is unlawful for any person to possess cannabis plants; except that the effect of this chapter shall be limited for purposes of municipal prosecution to persons knowingly possessing five (5) or fewer cannabis plants.
- C. The City of Darien prohibits the on-premises consumption of cannabis at or in a cannabis business establishment within its jurisdiction in a manner consistent with the Act.

## 8-7-3 PENALTY

Any person violating this section shall be fined not less than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) for the first offense and five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for a subsequent offense for possession.

# <u>8-7-1 CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES AND CANNABIS DEFINED:</u> <u>8-7-2 VIOLATION</u> <u>8-7-3 PENALTY</u>

#### 8-7-1 CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES AND CANNABIS DEFINED:

#### ADULT-USE CANNABIS DISPENSARIES

A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation to acquire cannabis from licensed cannabis business establishments for the purpose of selling or dispensing cannabis, cannabis-infused products, cannabis seeds, paraphernalia or related supplies to purchasers or to qualified registered medical cannabis patients and caregivers, per the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, (P.A.101-0027), as it may be amended from time-to-time, and regulations promulgated thereunder.

#### CANNABIS

Includes marijuana, hashish and other substances which are identified as including any parts of the plant Cannabis sativa, whether growing or not; the seeds thereof, the resin extracted from any part of such plant; and any compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture or preparation of such plant, its seeds, or resin, including tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and all other cannabinol derivatives, including its naturally occurring or synthetically produced ingredients, whether produced directly or indirectly by extraction, or independently by means of chemical synthesis or by a combination of extraction and chemical synthesis; but shall not include the mature stalks of such plant, fiber produced from such stalks, oil or cake made from the seeds of such plant, any other compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of such mature stalks (except the resin extracted therefrom), fiber, oil or cake, or the sterilized seed of such plant which is incapable of germination.

#### CANNABIS REGULATION AND TAX ACT (CRTA)

The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act (CRTA) legalizes and regulates the production, consumption, and sale of recreational cannabis in Illinois. The CRTA allows Illinois residents over the age of twenty-one (21) to possess and privately use recreational cannabis in limited quantities; however, use of cannabis in public places is prohibited.

#### CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE

A drug, substance, or immediate precursor in the schedules of Article II of the Illinois Controlled Substances Act, 720 Illinois Compiled Statutes 570/201 et seq., as amended.

#### CRAFT GROWER

A facility operated by an organization or business that is licensed by the Department of Agriculture to cultivate, dry, cure, and package cannabis and perform other necessary activities to make cannabis available for sale at a dispensing organization or use at a processing organization. Craft-grower operations are not allowed in the City of Darien.

# **ON-PREMISES CONSUMPTION**

A unit of local government, including a home rule unit, or any non-home rule county within the unincorporated territory of the county may regulate the on-premises consumption of cannabis at or in a cannabis business establishment within its jurisdiction in a manner consistent with the CRTA. The CRTA applies the restrictions of the Smoke Free Illinois Act on smoking cannabis and provides that property owners may prohibit the use of cannabis by any guest, lessee, customer or visitor.

# DISPENSARIES

The CRTA pertains to the possession, use, cultivation, transportation, and dispensing of adult-use cannabis. The City of Darien has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that protect the public health, safety, and welfare of its citizens.

The City of Darien will permit adult use recreational cannabis dispensaries consistent with zoning ordinances regulating adult use recreational cannabis business establishments, including rules adopted governing the time, place, manner, and number of cannabis business establishments, and minimum distance limitations between cannabis business establishments and locations the City deems sensitive through a special use process.

The appropriate zoning ordinances, rules, and definitions shall be promulgated in the City's Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) effective January 1, 2020, as amended from time-to-time.

# 8-7-2 VIOLATION

- A. It is unlawful for any person to manufacture, deliver, or possess any and all equipment, products, and materials of any kind which are peculiar to and marketed for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing in the human body any controlled substance, including any and all articles listed in the Illinois Drug Paraphernalia Control Act, 720 Illinois Compiled Statutes 600, as amended.
- B. It is unlawful for any person under the age of twenty-one (21), or not in compliance with the Illinois Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, to knowingly possess any quantity of any substance containing cannabis, except that the effect of this chapter shall be limited for purposes of municipal prosecution to persons knowingly possessing less than thirty grams (30g) of cannabis flower; five hundred milligrams (500mg) of tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) contained in cannabis-infused product; or five grams (5g) of cannabis concentrates. Unless authorized under the Illinois Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Pilot Program Act or the Illinois Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, it is unlawful for any person to possess cannabis plants; except that the effect of this chapter shall be limited for purposes of municipal prosecution to persons knowingly possessing five (5) or fewer cannabis plants.
- C. The City of Darien prohibits the on-premises consumption of cannabis at or in a cannabis business establishment within its jurisdiction in a manner consistent with the Act.

# 8-7-3 PENALTY

Any person violating this section shall be fined not less than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) for the first offense and five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for a subsequent offense for possession.

# **Development History and Proposal**

The Safeguard Self-Storage facility received approvals in 2002 and was constructed shortly thereafter. The building sits approximately 75 feet from the primary Lemont Road frontage, and 100 feet from the north road frontage. Several large deciduous trees help to screen the buildings height, which is 3 stories and approximately 40 feet. The building is unique in that there is no parapet wall at the cap of the building. Parapet walls typically extend higher than the roof, and are often constructed to screen various types of rooftop equipment.

The petitioner proposes to install a solar array in the flat roof of the building. Solar panels installed on a flat roof must be installed at an angle, and although not excessive in height, are approximately 14 inches off the roof at the highest point.

Section 5A-5-9-8(B)5 states "panels on a flat roof that are not flush-mounted must have a parapet or screening wall between the panels and the adjacent street and said parapet or screening wall must be at least as high as the panels." Non-Flush mounted panels are further defined as any panels that extend more than 6 inches above the roof.

As presented, at 14 inches in height and without parapet wall on the building to properly screen the panels, the installation cannot occur without a variation. The petitioner has provided a response to the variation standards in a justification narrative which is attached.

The petitioner states that the unique condition of the property is the overall height of the building in comparison to surrounding development, and that the panels will not be seen in close proximity to the building. Line-of-sign diagrams have been provided for discussion.

# Staff Plan Review

The City's solar code was revised in 2018 with the intention of removing obstructions to solar arrays when meeting certain conditions. Although the intent of the code was to prevent flat-roofed buildings, which are primarily commercial and office buildings, from installing visible solar panels and degrading the quality of a building's architectural elevation, there were no exceptions written in the code when the impact would be unseen or minimal. Staff is supportive of the request based on the information as presented.

# Findings of Fact

The Petitioner was asked to provide evidence or finding-of-fact that would support the requested variation, especially in terms of the pertinent variation criteria. Staff notes relevant criteria below:

- Unique Circumstances This building was constructed in and industrial/office area with large setbacks and without a parapet screen wall.
- Character of the Locality Although the roof has no parapet to screen the panels, the building's height will eliminate or minimize any visual effect to the adjacent properties.
- Smallest Solution Installation of a screen or parapet wall will require significant improvements to the roof structure.

# PZC 6/17/2020

The Planning and Zoning Commission reviewed this petition at their public hearing on June 17. The petitioner presented the variation request and answered questions on overall visibility and impacts on the surroundings. No residents were in attendance regarding the petition. To address future precedent and the fact that the recently adopted code did not make exception to visibility, the motion for approval was specific to note that these solar panels could not be viewed from the street. The PZC made findings that the petition satisfied variation justifications and voted 7-0 to recommend approval of the request.

# <u>MSC – 7/20/2020</u>

The Municipal Services Committee will discuss just prior to consideration by City Council and will forward a recommendation.

We request a Variance from this statement: Panels on a flat roof that are not flush-mounted must have a parapet or screening wall between the panels and the adjacent streat and sake parapet or screening wall must be at level as the canels. We request a Variance because the proposed solar system will not be seen from the ground or neighboring buildings. This particular racking plus modules (collectors) only reaches a height of 13.5(in) from the surface of the roof at its highest point. The building's fast roof upon which we are installing is a 35(h) 3 slory building that has no parapets, yet it has existing equipment on the roof located on the west corner of the building's most notably a gas pipe and a curb mounted roof hatch that are the same height as our equipment. Neither can be seen from ground level. Additionally, the solar modules (collectors) are set back from the edge of the roof by at least 4 ft.

# **Justification Narrative: City of Darien**

This justification narrative is in regards to the PV solar array being proposed on top of the Safeguard Storage building located at 8131 Lemont Rd. Darien, IL. We are requesting that we are permitted to construct this solar array without adding a parapet wall on the perimeter of the building as written in the City of Darien's code.

The variance is being requested due to there being no net visual benefit to adding this parapet wall to shield the array from being seen. As it currently exists, there are no vantage points that allow the system to be seen from around the building or from neighbors' buildings. There are currently roof hatches and other HVAC equipment on the roof that are of similar or greater height than our proposed solar array, and those cannot be seen from the surrounding areas.

Hardship condition would be an undo financial cost burden on the building owner. Adding a parapet wall is a costly endeavor and may involve modifying the structure of the building. This cost may effectively kill the project because the cost would be too great for the project to bear. In addition, the building is owned by a larger franchise entity which has a specific marketing brand/color scheme/aesthetic, and adding this parapet wall may disrupt that exterior brand.

As previously mentioned, there would be no impact on neighbors since it will not be possible to see the solar array from their vantage points. They will not know it is present.

2a. Not applicable

**2b.** We are currently installing numerous systems around numerous different cities and towns in Illinois and this is the only jurisdiction that is making such a request. Modifying the exterior of the building in this way is unnecessary, especially in this case where there will be no net benefit for anyone.

**2c.** The location of this building is in an industrial park, so adding a solar array to the roof without a parapet will not affect the essential character of the locality. The roof is 3 stories off the ground.

**3a.** As previously mentioned, if we were required to construct a parapet wall it may jeopardize the financial viability of installing solar at this store location.

3b. Not applicable

**3c.** There is no other simple and efficient way to install solar on this roof, although modifying our solar design would still not comply with the code the way it is presently written.

**3d.** Installing solar on top of this building will not cause any difficulty, hardship, burden or loss of value to neighboring buildings. Buildings are generously spaced, it is contained within an industrial park and the roof that the solar will be installed on is as high or higher than any other neighboring building.

**3e.** Future variances pertaining to solar array isntallations can be considered on a case by case basis based on the unique visual circumstances and the surrounding area where the building exists.






3f. The positive impact on making an exception to this code is to increase the adoption of clean, renewable and distributed energy in local communities such as Darien. **3g.** The only thing that this solar installation will do is increase the value of the building due to it having its own energy generation on site. The only other thing that could be considered is aesthetic, which does not apply here because it cannot be seen from any reasonable vantage point.




Fig. 2.1 - Uniform Roof Snow Load on Array

# CITY OF DARIEN ZONING VARIATIONS JUSTIFICATION NARRATIVE

#### Purpose

To be consistent and fair, the City is obligated to make decisions on zoning variation requests based on findings-offact. The Applicant should write a justification narrative that contains evidence (facts) that support a conclusion (finding) that the variation is necessary and would not cause problems. It should include: a) explanation of why the variation is being requested, b) describe the 'hardship condition' of the property that makes it difficult to conform, c) estimate the impact on neighbors , and d) respond to each of the decision criteria below.

Decision Criteria (See City Code Section 5A-2-2-3)

2a. The property in question cannot yield a reasonable return if permitted to be used only under the conditions allowed by the regulations in the zone.

2b. The plight of the owner is due to unique circumstances.

2c. The variation if granted will not alter the essential character of the locality.

3a. Essential Need? The owner would suffer substantial difficulty or hardship and not mere inconvenience or a decrease in financial gain if the variation is not granted.

3b. Problem with Property? There is a feature of the property such as slope or shape or change made to the property, which does not exist on neighboring properties, which makes it unreasonable for the owner to make the proposed improvement in compliance with the Zoning Code. Such feature or change was not made by the current owner and was not known to the current buyer at the time of purchase.

3c. Smallest Solution? There is no suitable or reasonable way to redesign the proposed improvements without incurring substantial difficulty or hardship or reduce the amount of variation required to make such improvements.

3d. Create Neighbor Problem? The variation, if granted, will not cause a substantial difficulty, undue hardship, unreasonable burden, or loss of value to the neighboring properties.

3e. Create Community Problem? The variation, if granted, may result in the same or similar requests from other property owners within the community, but will not cause an unreasonable burden or undesirable result within the community.

3f. Net Benefit? The positive impacts to the community outweigh the negative impacts.

3g. Sacrifice Basic Protections? The variation, if granted, will comply with the purposes and intent of the Zoning Code set forth in Section 5A-1-2(A) and summarized as follows; to lessen congestion, to avoid overcrowding, to prevent blight, to facilitate public services, to conserve land values, to protect from incompatible uses, to avoid nuisances, to enhance aesthetic values, to ensure an adequate supply of light and air, and to protect public health, safety, and welfare.

# AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A VARIATION FROM SECTION 5A-5-9-8(B) OF THE DARIEN ZONING REGULATIONS

#### (PZC 2020-06 8131 Lemont Road)

**WHEREAS,** the City of Darien is a home rule unit of local government pursuant to the provisions of Article VII, Section 6 of the Illinois Constitution of 1970; and

WHEREAS, as a home rule unit of local government, the City may exercise any power and perform any function pertaining to its government except as limited by Article VII, Section 6; and

WHEREAS, the property legally described in Section 1 (the "Subject Property"), is zoned OR&I Office, Research and Light Industrial District pursuant to the Darien Zoning Regulations; and

**WHEREAS,** the petitioner has requested approval of a variation from the terms of the Darien Zoning Regulations, Section 5A-5-9-8(B)5 of the City Code, that otherwise requires solar panels be screened with a parapet or screening wall when in excess of 6 inches in height, to allow for the installation of solar panels , which have a height of 14 inches, without such a wall, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to proper legal notice, a Public Hearing on said petition for variation was held before the Planning and Zoning Commission on June 17, 2020; and

# **ISSUE STATEMENT**

A Resolution Approving an Intergovernmental Agreement for Participation in the DuPage County Local Government Covid-19 Reimbursement Program.

# **<u>RESOLUTION</u>** <u>BACKUP</u>

# **BACKGROUND HISTORY**

The Intergovernmental agreement with DuPage County is the mechanism set up to provide the city with reimbursement expenses incurred due to Covid 19. The County of DuPage received approximately one hundred sixty-one million dollars (\$161,000,000) from the United States Government pursuant to the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act. The CARES Act provides that payments from the Coronavirus Relief Fund may only be used to cover expenses which:

(1) Are necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19)

(2) Were not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020 (the date of enactment of the CARES Act) for the local government

(3) Were incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020 and ends on December 30, 2020. The United States Department of Treasury has issued guidelines with regards to the authorized use of funds allocated to local governments under the CARES Act.

The County is not required to disburse any funds to local municipalities within its geographic boundaries but they have agreed to reimburse for certain expenses allowed in the Department of Treasury guidelines. The proposed agreement was developed by the County with input from the DuPage Mayors and Managers Conference with the goal of one standard agreement throughout DuPage County.

In summary, the expenses eligible for reimbursement include:

- The cost of tangible goods and services. Examples of "Tangible Goods" would include, but are not limited to, personal protection and medical equipment, sanitation and disinfectant products, software, laptops and technology equipment necessary for employees to telecommute. "Services" as used in this definition means actions or intangible things that were performed by individuals who are not municipal employees such as contractual cleaning companies. (estimated at \$40,000 as of May 31, 2020)
- Payroll costs for municipal employees where such employees time was substantially dedicated to mitigating the spread or responding to the public health emergency (amount to be determined by internal analysis)
- Costs for economic development programs designed to support and defray the costs of local businesses (within the geographic boundaries of DuPage County) negatively impacted by the executive orders which required such businesses be closed or have their operations seriously curtailed. (estimated at \$295,000)

**RE: CARES Act Allocation** 

Dear President Chirico and Members of DMMC,

Yesterday, the State of Illinois announced its Local Coronavirus Urgent Remediation Emergency (CURE) program to distribute funds to local governments that did not receive a direct allocation under the federal CARES Act. The program sets aside funds for municipalities and counties, local health departments, other units of local government, and a reserve amount to be distributed on a needs-basis later in the calendar year.

Following DuPage's model, the State's municipal reimbursement program allocates funds on a per-capita basis (\$41.50), establishes a certification and agreement process, places a cap on each local government distribution, and requires the submittal of documented COVID-19 related expenses to a third party for review and approval of eligible expenses. Accordingly, municipalities located in multiple counties and also receiving funds from the State will find it seamless to request funds from both.

Although the State is not allocating \$51.84 per-capita as previously referenced by DMMC, DuPage County remains committed to distributing these funds to our municipal partners and will consider additional allocations later in the year if permitted.

# INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEEMENT FOR PARTICIPATION IN DUPAGE COUNTY LOCAL GOVERNMENT COVID-19 REIMBURSEMENT PROGRAM.

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into on this 14th day of July, 2020 by and between the County of DuPage, a body politic and corporate, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY" and the municipality of City of Darien, an unit of municipal government, hereinafter referred to as "MUNICIPALITY", and collectively referred to as "the Parties".

#### RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Illinois Constitution and the Intergovernmental Cooperation Act (5 ILCS 220/ et. seq) authorize units of local government, including counties and municipalities, to contract or otherwise associate among themselves in any manner not prohibited by law and to jointly exercise any power, privilege or authority conferred upon them by law; and

WHEREAS, Article 7, Section 10 of the Illinois Constitution of 1971 and the Illinois Intergovernmental Cooperation Act 5 ILCS 220/1 et seq. allow units of public entities to enter into intergovernmental agreements in the furtherance of their governmental purposes; and

WHEREAS, the County of DuPage received approximately one hundred sixty-one million dollars (\$161,000,000) from the United States Government pursuant to the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act"); and

WHEREAS, the CARES Act provides for payments to local governments navigating the impact of the COVID-19 outbreak via the Coronavirus Relief Fund; and

WHEREAS, the CARES Act provides that payments from the Coronavirus Relief Fund may only be used to cover expenses which: (1) are necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19); (2) were not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020 (the date of enactment of the CARES Act) for the local government; and (3) were incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020 and ends on December 30, 2020; and WHEREAS, the County of DuPage was eligible to receive payments under the CARES Act, as it is a unit of local government in excess of 500,000 residents: and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Treasury has issued guidelines with regards to the authorized use of funds allocated to local governments under the CARES Act; and

WHEREAS, neither the CARES Act, the United States Department of Treasury, nor state law, requires that the County disburse any funds to local municipalities within its geographic boundaries; and

WHEREAS, under the CARES Act, the County is ultimately responsible for any expenditures from CARES Act funds; and

WHEREAS, much uncertainty remains regarding future costs the County and local municipalities will be forced to bear related to the coronavirus emergency, and

WHEREAS, much uncertainty exists as to the potential for future allocations of federal or state monies to defray those future costs, and

WHEREAS, this agreement is intended to promote the most efficient distribution of resources which have been made available to the State of Illinois and the County of DuPage to benefit the citizens of DuPage County, and

WHEREAS, under the CARES Act, should the Office of the Inspector General determine that the funds were used in a manner contrary to the intent of the legislature or contrary to the United States' Department of Treasury guidelines, the CARES ACT provides that the federal government may recoup the improperly spent funds from the County; and

WHEREAS, the County, those municipalities within DuPage County, and their residents, have suffered secondary effects of the coronavirus emergency, as the State of Illinois has ordered the closure of non-essential businesses; and

WHEREAS, the County of DuPage, as the jurisdiction responsible for disbursement of funds under the CARES Act, finds that it is appropriate to use these funds to defray certain costs incurred by the Municipality related to the coronavirus emergency; and WHEREAS, the disbursement of funds under the CARES Act to the Municipality is in the best interests of the County, the Municipality and their residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and Agreements contained herein, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

# 1.0 Recitals, Definitions, and Purpose.

- 1.1 Recitals Incorporated. The recitals set forth above are incorporated in this Agreement by reference and made a part of this Intergovernmental Agreement ("IGA").
- 1.2 Definitions.
  - A. "CARES Act funds" shall refer to funds which have been allocated to DuPage County under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act") of which DuPage County is responsible for the disposition.
  - B. "Forms" shall refer to forms or application documents used to seek reimbursement of coronavirus related expenses under this agreement.
  - "Expenses" C. shall refer to the cost of tangible qoods and services which (1)were necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19); (2) were not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of March 27, 2020 (the date of enactment of the CARES Act) for the local government; and (3) were incurred during the period that begins on March 1, 2020 and ends on December 30, 2020. Examples of "Tangible Goods" would include, but are not limited to, personal protection and medical equipment, sanitation and disinfectant products, software, laptops and technology equipment necessary for employees to telecommute. "Services" as used in this definition means actions or intangible things which were performed by individuals who are not municipal employees. Further, "Expenses" shall include payroll costs for municipal employees where such employees substantially dedicated time was to mitigating the spread or responding to the public

health emergency and/or who have been reassigned from their budgeted role to a different function to substantially support COVID-19 related activities. "Expenses" shall not include the complete payroll costs for employees who are not substantially dedicated to the mitigation or response to the public health emergency, except as set forth in 5.1 of this Agreement. Expenses may also include economic development programs designed to support and defray the costs of local businesses (within the geographic boundaries of DuPage County) negatively impacted by the executive orders which required such businesses be closed or have their operations seriously curtailed.

- D. All other words used in this agreement which are not specifically defined shall have their normal and ordinary meaning.
- Purpose. The purpose of this Agreement is to establish 1.3 contractual relationship between а the County and Municipality with regards to the proposed reimbursement of municipal expenses associated with the coronavirus emergency from federal CARES Act funds which the United States Federal Government has disbursed to the County. The County has, by resolution, created the DuPage County Local Government COVID-19 Reimbursement program. This agreement shall remain in effect between the parties to govern the form of applications for reimbursement, the review of applications, the criteria for reimbursable expenses, the retention of documents, and other material terms governing the processing of reimbursement applications.

#### 2.0 Obligations of the County

- 2.1 Generally. The County, by and through its Finance Department or Third-Party Consultant hired by the County, shall process requests for reimbursement received by Municipality subject to the requirements set forth herein.
- 2.2 Submittal does not guarantee approval. The County, by receiving and processing the reimbursement requests of Municipality, does not guarantee approval of the reimbursement requests by the DuPage County Board, the DuPage County Finance Department, the United States

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Department of Treasury, or the Office of the Inspector General.

2.3 No further obligations. The County shall have no further obligations under this IGA other than those expressly set forth.

#### 3.0 Obligations of the Municipality

Generally. In order to submit requests for reimbursement 3.1 of coronavirus emergency related expenditures, Municipality agrees to submit the forms, certifications and documentations set forth in this IGA for any expense for which Municipality seeks reimbursement under this Agreement. Municipality agrees that the sole and exclusive decision as to whether or not Municipalities request is granted lies within the discretion of the DuPage County Board, and that submission of expenses for reimbursement does not obligate the County to agree to reimburse those Municipality agrees that expenses. the County Board, through its Finance Department Third-Party or Administrator, may reject expenses which are clearly not permitted uses for CARES ACT funds such as using the funds for revenue replacement.

# 4.0 Form of Expense Submittals, Certification, failure to use form or comply with criteria

- 4.1 Generally. The Parties agree that expenses for which Municipality seeks reimbursement shall be submitted in a manner and on forms created by the Third Party Administrator hired by the County to process reimbursement requests. County and Third Party Administrator shall work collaboratively with Municipality and DuPage Mayors and Managers Conference to ensure that the forms and process properly balance administrative convenience to the Parties and provide sufficient information for the County Board to issue a reimbursement.
- 4.2 Certification. Each request for reimbursement shall be accompanied by a certification wherein the Mayor/President, certifies that the expenses for which Municipality seeks reimbursement: (i) are necessarv expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with response to the Coronavirus Disease 2019, (ii) which were not accounted for in the most recently approved budget of the municipality, as of March 27, 2020, (iii) were

incurred during the period between March 1, 2020 and December 30, 2020. By entering into the IGA, Municipality authorizes its Mayor or President to sign such certification on behalf of Municipality.

- 4.3 Failure to comply with Department of Treasury Guidelines. The County reserves the right to reject any reimbursement which it feels, in its sole and exclusive discretion, does not meet the criteria of the CARES Act or United States Department of Treasury guidelines associated with disbursement of funds under the CARES Act. Such rejection may be made by the DuPage County Board. This section shall not be held to restrict the County Finance Department or Third-Party Administrator from rejecting requests which clearly fail to comply with the CARES Act or with Department of Treasury guidelines.
- 5.0 Expenses to be reimbursed; Caps of maximum of amount reimbursements available to Municipality; prohibition on duplicate reimbursement.
  - Municipality may submit expenses as set forth in section 5.1 1.2(c) of this Agreement. Where submitted expenses are seeking reimbursement for employee payroll, the County requires that the expenses be separated into two categories. The first category shall be employees whose time was substantially dedicated to mitigating the spread or responding to the public health emergency and/or who have been reassigned from their budgeted role to a different function to substantially support COVID-19 related activities. For purposes of this section "substantially dedicated" shall mean that sixty percent (60%) or more of the employees' time was dedicated to mitigating the spread or responding to the public health emergency related to COVID-19. Municipality may submit, and the County Board will consider, reimbursing 100% of the salary of "substantially dedicated" employees. The second category shall consist of employees whose time is not "substantially dedicated" to mitigating the spread of or responding to the COVID-19 public health emergency, but who have spent some portion of their compensated time (but less than sixty percent (60%)) mitigating the spread of or responding to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. The Municipality may submit, and the County Board will

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reimbursing consider, payroll in the amount of the proportion of the individual employees' time spent mitigating the spread of or responding to the COVID-19 public health emergency. For example, if an employee spent twenty percent (20%) of his or her compensated time mitigating the spread of or responding to the COVID-19 public health emergency, the municipality may submit for reimbursement of twenty percent (20%) of the employees' salary during the period of time in which the employee was engaging in COVID-19 related responses.

- 5.2 Municipality shall not be entitled to reimbursement of expenses for which it has received reimbursement from another County, State, or federal program designed to reimburse local government for costs associated with the coronavirus emergency emergencies. or other If Municipality receives reimbursement from any program referenced above, Municipality shall refund any duplicate reimbursement to the County.
- 5.3 Under this program, Municipality shall receive, in aggregate, no more than fifty-one dollars and eighty-four cents (\$51.84) for each resident of the Municipality who resides within the geographic boundaries of DuPage County as set forth in Schedule 1 attached to this Agreement. This section shall not bar future additional expenditures by County for specific municipalities which may be disproportionately impacted by COVID-19 and which, in the County's sole opinion, require additional resources to respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency.
- 5.4 Where Municipality is located, in part, in DuPage County and in part, in other Counties, Municipality should prorate their requested expense reimbursements based upon the population of their residents which reside within DuPage County. For Example, if Municipality has sixty percent (60%) of its population in DuPage County, a municipality may seek reimbursement for sixty percent (60%) of the total cost of the expense eligible for reimbursement. Municipality shall not pro-rate expenses which were used only to the benefit of DuPage County residents.
- 6.0 Cooperation

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- **6.1** The County shall assist Municipality in complying with the requirements of the CARES Act and the United States Department of Treasury guidelines by preparing sample forms and providing feedback and guidance with regards to the type and quality of information required to complete such forms.
- **6.2** Municipality agrees to abide by the terms of the CARES Act and all United States Department of Treasury guidelines.
- 6.3 Municipality shall, at the County's request, supply County with all relevant information for the County to evaluate whether a request for reimbursement meets the criteria under the CARES Act and United States Department of Treasury guidelines.

#### 7.0 Records

- 7.1 Municipality shall maintain all records relating to the expenses which Municipality seeks to have reimbursed by County from CARES Act funds for a period of at least ten (10) years or the period of time required by other state or federal law, whichever is longer.
- 7.2 At any time, DuPage County, the DuPage County Finance Department, or the DuPage County Auditor, may request that the Municipality provide records relating to the expenses which Municipality seeks to have reimbursed. Municipality agrees to provide records in response to such requests.
- 7.3 Failure to provide records may result in the denial of the reimbursement request. In circumstances where the reimbursement request has been granted and the records are needed to justify the reimbursement to the Office of the Inspector General or any other office, official, or department which may later become responsible for auditing disbursements of CARES Act funds, failure by Municipality to provide these records, for any reason including the prior destruction of these records, shall constitute a breach of this Agreement. The sole and exclusive remedy for such a breach is that Municipality shall be responsible for repayment of any disbursement which the Office of Inspector General, or its successor, finds improper, unsupported, or unable to be verified. Additionally, Municipality agrees to indemnify the County or make the County whole for any penalty assessed against the County

based upon Municipality's failure to retain or provide records.

#### 8.0 Timeliness.

- 8.1 The Parties agree that time is of the essence in the processing of applications for reimbursement. The County shall use all reasonable speed and diligence in the processing of applications for reimbursement.
- 8.2 The Parties agree that time is of the essence in communications seeking supporting documents or requesting records under this agreement. The Parties agree that they shall use all reasonable speed and diligence in responding to requests for records or supporting documents.

#### 9.0 Indemnity.

- 9.1 The Parties agree that where the County relied upon the certification of the Municipality that such expenses which Municipality sought to have reimbursed from CARES Act funds met the minimum requirements of the CARES Act, and where the Office of the Inspector General, or any other person, official, or department which is charged with the auditing and review of expenditures of CARES Act funds determines that such reimbursement was not permitted under the CARES Act, Municipality agrees to indemnify, reimburse and make whole the County for any funds which the United States Government or its agencies seeks to recoup or collect, either by litigation, or by withholding other federal funds owed to the County. Municipality further agrees to indemnify, reimburse, or make whole the County for any penalties associated with the federal government seeking to recoup the expended CARES Act funds which the County disbursed to Municipality including interest, or any penalty provided by law.
- **9.2** Municipality agrees to hold County harmless for any evaluation or advice which the County provided to Municipality as to whether the requested reimbursement is a permissible use of the CARES Act funds.

#### 10.0 Term and termination

10.1 Term. This Agreement shall remain in effect until either party provides written notice of termination to the other. Such notice shall be effective 14 days after receipt of the termination. 10.2 Survival of Terms. Those terms relating to the party's obligation to maintain records and provide records, and the Municipality's indemnification of the County shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

# 11.0 Amendment

11.1 Amendments to this Agreement may be performed with the written consent of the DuPage County Board and Municipal governing board.

# 12.0 Notices and duplicate copies.

12.2 The Parties agree that this agreement may be entered into using identical counterparts, each of which when executed and delivered to the other party shall constitute

# AGENDA MEMO City Council July 20, 2020

### **ISSUE STATEMENT**

A motion to direct Staff to proceed with a Landscape Enhancement Project and Easement Agreement for the northwest corner at 7532 Cass Avenue, PIN# 09-28-402-025.

### BACKGROUND/HISTORY

As part of an enhancement to the Center of Town City Staff was directed to render drawings for a landscape feature at the northwest corner of Cass Avenue and Plainfield Road. The landscape enhancement includes designs with and without a pond less water feature. The water feature would run 365 days a year.

The landscape enhancement would further incorporate two signs for the business. The signs will meet the City code and will not require a variation(s). All sign costs will be the responsibility of 7532 Cass Avenue LLC. Mr. Manos has approved the terms of the agreement. <u>Attachment 1</u> is three (3) options of the concept drawings for the proposed design. The Options are further described and cost estimates are as follows:

- 1. Straight sign with water feature on both sides of the sign-\$20,000
- 2. V shaped sign with no water feature-\$27,000
- 3. V shaped sign with water feature-\$37,000

Please note all options include silver lettering CITY OF DARIEN to be placed on the wall.

Staff is recommending Option 3 at a cost not to exceed \$42,000 and includes a \$5,000 contingency for adjustments that may be required due to sight configurations, specifically due to field elevations and grades. The landscape enhancement costs would be shared with 7532 Cass Avenue LLC at a 50/50 cost share, at a cost not to exceed \$42,000. The City's share would be \$21,000 and 7532 Cass Avenue LLC would be responsible for the remaining \$21,000. Regardless of the option that is chosen, all options would include a \$5,000 contingency.

Brick retaining wall that would best match the colors of the clock tower wall Various plantings variations \*Waterless pond water feature designed to run 365 days a year Landscape Lighting

\*The site has an existing water service that would be utilized for the water feature and Staff would assist with the configuration as required. Having the water on site provides a \$5,000 savings from installation and slightly less to have the service terminated from the water main. The City would be responsible for all costs related to the water usage.

Electric service will be required for the pump, lighting, and signage. The costs associated for the construction of the electric service and utility costs will be the responsibility of the 7532 Cass Avenue LLC. It is estimated that the energy costs for the water feature and landscape lighting will be approximately \$1,500 per year.

An annual landscape maintenance agreement will be required and has been estimated to cost approximately \$3,000 - \$4,000 per year. It is recommended that the actual costs be shared at a 50/50 proportion. The City will incorporate the landscape maintenance into the existing landscape maintenance currently in place.

The work will be completed through 7532 Cass Avenue LLC and the City will reimburse 7532 Cass Avenue LLC on actual costs and lien waivers. The work is required to meet the prevailing wage act.

The Easement Agreement encapsulates the following:

Creates an easement area which allows the City to maintain, the landscape enhancement and authorizes recordation of the corresponding Plat of Easement

An easement agreement between the City and the property owner, 7532 Cass Avenue LLC will be forthcoming, pending landscape option. A Plat of Easement will be prepared and will be recorded with the County of DuPage upon approval of the Easement Agreement.







# **CITY OF DARIEN**

# RULES FOR COMPLIANCE WITH PUBLIC COMMENT REQUIREMENTS OF THE ILLINOIS OPEN MEETINGS ACT

### I. PURPOSE OF RULES.

The purpose of these Rules is to comply with the requirement of Section 2.06 of the Illinois Open Meetings Act that a public comment section be provided at each meeting subject to the Open Meetings Act.

#### II. DEFINITION OF "PUBLIC BODY" or "BODY."

For purposes of these Rules, the term "Public Body" or "Body" shall mean the City Council, any Committee of the City Council, and any Board and Commission established by the City Council.

#### III. RULES GOVERNING PUBLIC COMMENT.

A. Unless otherwise allowed by a majority vote of the Body, the public comment periods shall be as follows:

1. For the City Council, as set forth on the attached **Agenda template**.

2. For Council committees and advisory committees, at the conclusion of the meeting immediately before adjournment. At the direction of the Body, the floor may be opened for public comment in conjunction with specific agenda items.

B. Individuals seeking to make public comment to the Body shall be formally recognized by the Chair.

C. Individuals addressing the Body shall identify themselves by name, but need not provide their home address.

D. Individuals addressing the Body shall do so by addressing their comments to the Body

itself and shall not turn to address the audience.

E. Public comment time shall be limited to three (3) minutes per person.

F. An individual will be allowed a second opportunity to address the Body only after all other interested persons have addressed the Body and only upon the majority vote of the Body.

G. In the case of a special meeting, public comment will be limited to subject matters germane to the agenda of the special meeting.

# IV. PUBLIC HEARING REQUIREMENTS.

Additional public comments periods will be allowed as required by law in the case of public hearing, subject to the same time constraints.
