In 1992 the City Council decided to offer the Darien Identification Vehicle Sticker to Darien community organizations through the lottery process. The following organizations were offered the opportunity to participate in the 2018 Vehicle Sticker Lottery:

Darien Chamber of Commerce Darien Rotary Club Darien Youth Club The Active Seniors Club Younger Than Ever Seniors Darien Historical Society Darien Woman's Club Safety Village of Darien Young At Heart Seniors

There are three (3) provisions that must be followed:

- The funds from the vehicle sticker donations be used for community related functions.
- The winner in one year will not be eligible for the lottery for a two-year period after winning.
- The City reserves the right to withdraw this lottery due to budget constraints.

Recently the Darien Police Department, through Facebook, announced a plan of action for Route 83. It read:

Police Department Press Release – Traffic Enforcement Alert Law Enforcement Agencies Join Forces for Special Traffic Enforcement Effort on Illinois Route 83

Darien Police Take Part in Multi-Jurisdictional Initiative Promoting Highway Safety

The Darien Police Department is joining forces with other law enforcement agencies along the Illinois Route 83 corridor through Cook and DuPage County in a special traffic safety campaign Friday, September 29, 2017. The purpose of the campaign is to increase the safety of motorists utilizing the thoroughfare through education and traffic enforcement. Our efforts will be concentrated on speed, occupant restraint violations, driving under the influence and other safety violations observed during our enforcement. Every municipal police agency with jurisdiction over Illinois Route 83 has been invited to participate in the traffic safety campaign. Each jurisdiction has been asked to implement their own enforcement action based upon the needs of their communities.

The Darien Police Department reminds you to DRIVE SMART - DRIVE SAFE!

Once posted there was a response that read:

These aggressive revenue generating campaigns initiated by our elected officials in the name of "safety" are a travesty. Please do not use our police force as a tool to generate revenue for our communities. It creates animosity toward our officers, and distracts them from the real crime happening in our community. Shame on you Mayor Weaver!

Though there was only one such posting this got me to think there may be more of this belief. It's a feeling many people have and those feelings probably will remain. Feelings are neither right nor wrong, but I would like to set the record straight regarding this matter.

This was not initiated by any elected official this was initiated by law enforcement attempting to keep people safe. We swore an oath to provide for the safety of the public and driving safety is a part of that obligation. It would obviously be so much easier and would greatly increase safety with voluntary compliance with the law. However, in some instances police need to step in and assist with compliance.

If this was a revenue generating campaign we would have just wrote tickets without notice and would have written tickets in a place where it is easier to write tickets and gain revenue. That's not what occurred. Again we want / need voluntary compliance. We do not want to issue tickets. We measure outcomes (e.g. fewer accidents), not outputs (number of citations). If one was to look at the ratio of warnings to tickets they would see from January to August of this year 59.3% of tickets issued are warning – no fine involved and 40.7% are citations with a fine.

The particular date in question was busy for our agency so we were only able to take 16 enforcement actions. Of those 16 enforcement actions, nine were citations, the rest were warnings or about 56.3% receiving a citation.

The City of Darien's budget is \$14,629,426 of which \$102,868 was from ticket revenue. About 0.007% of the city's budget comes from traffic fines.

Many people may not realize, but in June of 2014 and effective January 1st of 2015 Illinois passed SB3411 which stopped municipalities from establishing quotas or requiring officers to write citations.

I can certainly appreciate not wanting to alienate or create animosity toward officers from those driving in Darien. However, our officers are tasked with (best they can) creating a safe driving environment. That is accomplished in many ways and enforcement is a part of that process. Saying we won't enforce traffic to reduce animosity is akin to a parent who refuses to discipline a child because the parent wants to be a friend versus a parent. It is an unpleasant function, but necessary. An officer performing his/her required duties in a professional and appropriate manner is what will stop animosity from growing. Just as a note, I receive more comments about officers not enforcing laws than enforcing too much.

I have written a lot about crime in Darien. One thing many people don't realize is the amount of crime that is thwarted or suspects developed from traffic stops. One such example of developing a suspect from a traffic stop is Timothy McVeigh, the person who set off an explosive device outside the Oklahoma Federal Building. Not every traffic stop is going to be a McVeigh, but one cannot claim that traffic enforcement is not an officer's duty or a part of crime reduction. Many warrants and other arrests occur due to traffic stops. Crime isn't the only issue that causes harm. One can look at the number of accidents (fatal / personal injury) to see the harm done to those who use our roads because of a traffic violation. Even without an injury there is financial harm due to the property damage.

I've written before on traffic enforcement about right time, right place and right enforcement in order to reduce the number of accidents and increase the safety of our driving public. Taking appropriate enforcement in the areas of accidents near the time frame (time of day and day of week) that accidents occur. The Illinois State Police (ISP) has done something similar and ISP management wants troopers to look at roadways where fatal and near fatal accidents occur. The research done by the ISP indicates that Route 83 is a place that should receive attention. Through August of this year (2017) there was one fatal accident and twelve personal injury accidents. For the previous four years (2013-2016) there were 107 crashes (6 fatal / 101 personal injury). The after action report for the 09/29 enforcement day showed 18 agencies participating resulting in 380 traffic stops. These traffic stops yielded 259 citations for various moving violations including: 123 speeding citations, 14 cell phone use citations, 17 seatbelt citations, 3 Scott's Law citations and 102 other citations. Additionally, three warrants were served and two guns were taken off of the street.

Issue Statement

Motion to approve the tax levy determination for general and special purposes for Fiscal Year 2017-2018.

DRAFT ORDINANCE

Background/History

The process for setting a tax levy is to determine how much revenue to collect from the property tax, and request that the County levy a tax to generate that amount of money. The first approval required is the tax levy determination, which takes place prior to the approval of the tax levy ordinance. Not less than 20 days prior to the adoption of the aggregate levy, the Council shall determine the amounts of money to be levied. There are also special requirements if the aggregate amount of the Corporate and Special Purpose levy is more than 105% of the preceding year's extension and abatements.

Unfortunately, we are still subject to a timing constraint that requires us to make our initial request by the end of December, a few months before we are far enough into the budget process to make a final judgment on what we will need. In previous years the City has approached the process with an underlying assumption that the Council will not increase property taxes for the combined general corporate purpose (general fund) and special corporate levy (police pension fund).

At the same time, the Council can approve additional abatements up to the end of March. This gives the Council the ability to request a "ceiling" amount, while allowing us to review the budget early next year and consider abatements to the original request.

The attached ordinance requests a general corporate purpose (general fund=\$587,466) and special corporate levy (police pension fund=\$1,618,878) total of \$2,206,344, which represents a 0.00% increase over this year's non-bond extension (\$2,206,344). I determined the levy for the police pension fund based on the actuary report conducted on the Police Pension Fund.

With respect to the tax levy for Special Service Area #1, we have a plan for maintenance expenses for these wetlands and storm water infrastructure, and the recommended revenue from this levy is proposed to be maintained at \$5,000.

Additionally, a levy for any outstanding bonds has been filed upon the adoption of the bond ordinances. The 2017 levy amount to pay for the principal and interest on these bonds totals

\$491,702. Lastly, any bond abatement will be presented in conjunction with our budget review.

Committee Recommendation

The Administrative/Finance Committee and Staff recommend approval of the levy determination and ordinances which:

- Set the City's 2017 general property tax levy and special corporate tax levy (police pension fund) at \$2,206,344.
- Set the City's 2017 Special Service Area I property tax levy at \$5,000.

<u>Alternate Consideration</u>

Levy different amounts.

Decision Mode

The tax levy determination will be on the October 16, 2017 Council meeting for formal consideration. This final tax levy ordinance will be on the November 20, 2017, City Council agenda for formal consideration.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Darien, Illinois, adopted the Annual Budget for the City of Darien, Illinois, for the Fiscal Year beginning on May 1, 2017, and ending on April 30, 2018, and which has been duly published.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DARIEN, DU PAGE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, IN THE EXERCISE OF ITS HOME RULE POWERS, as follows:

RULES FOR COMPLIANCE WITH PUBLIC COMMENT REQUIREMENTS OF THE ILLINOIS OPEN MEETINGS ACT

I. PURPOSE OF RULES.

The purpose of these Rules is to comply with the requirement of Section 2.06 of the Illinois Open Meetings Act that a public comment section be provided at each meeting subject to the Open Meetings Act.

II. DEFINITION OF "PUBLIC BODY" or "BODY."

For purposes of these Rules, the term "Public Body" or "Body" shall mean the City Council, any Committee of the City Council, and any Board and Commission established by the City Council.

III. RULES GOVERNING PUBLIC COMMENT.

A. Unless otherwise allowed by a majority vote of the Body, the public comment periods shall be as follows:

1. For the City Council, as set forth on the attached **Agenda template**.

2. For Council committees and advisory committees, at the conclusion of the meeting immediately before adjournment. At the direction of the Body, the floor may be opened for public comment in conjunction with specific agenda items.

B. Individuals seeking to make public comment to the Body shall be formally recognized by the Chair.

C. Individuals addressing the Body shall identify themselves by name, but need not provide their home address.

D. Individuals addressing the Body shall do so by addressing their comments to the Body

itself and shall not turn to address the audience.

E. Public comment time shall be limited to three (3) minutes per person.

F. An individual will be allowed a second opportunity to address the Body only after all other interested persons have addressed the Body and only upon the majority vote of the Body.

G. In the case of a special meeting, public comment will be limited to subject matters germane to the agenda of the special meeting.

IV. PUBLIC HEARING REQUIREMENTS.

Additional public comments periods will be allowed as required by law in the case of public hearing, subject to the same time constraints.
